TIAR ministers plan new actions against Venezuela



Bogota, December 3 (RHC)-- The Inter-American Treaty of Reciprocal Assistance (TIAR) held a ministerial consultation meeting in Bogota, Colombia on Tuesday to evaluate the application of new measures against Venezuela.

Colombia's Foreign Minister Claudia Blum explained that TIAR ministers will take decisions about nonmilitary measures and sanctions against the Bolivarian revolution, as local media reported.

Participating in the Bogota meeting were governments aligned with the U.S. foreign policy -- Brazil, Chile, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Panama, Paraguay and Peru.

The U.S. Permanent Representative to the Organization of American States (OAS) Carlos Trujillo and the U.S. Acting Assistant Secretary for Western Hemisphere Affairs Michael Kozak also attended the TIAR meeting.

While representatives of the Latin American right-wing governments held their meeting, Venezuelan citizens carried out various mass political acts against TIAR and its veiled intentions to promote military intervention in this South American country.

"We summoned the United Socialist Party of Venezuela (PSUV) high military-political leadership, our workers, our social movements... and the Great Patriotic Pole parties," Venezuela's Youth and Sports Minister Pedro Infante said on the subject of citizen mobilizations against foreign interference.

Venezuelan workers and students began to meet at Caraca's Morelos Square from early Tuesday. Later, the Bolivarian militants went out to perform various political events in communities, neighborhoods, study centers and "Bolivar-Chavez" battle units.
